ARMY INTELLIGENCE (USAR): The insignia for Army Intelligence (USAR), also referred to as Military Intelligence (Reserve) or Military Intelligence Division, G-2, War Department General Staff, was wern during the period 31 March 1924 to 5 October 1962. On 17 August 1925 the Secretary of War autherized a distinctive cellar insignia for the Military Intelligence Section, Organized Reserve Cerps (ORC). Designs were submitted and one consisting of an earred shield bearing a circle connected with the border by 13 radial ribs, within the circle a sphinx in prefile (couchant) was approved by the Secretary of War on 22 October 1925. On 19 Nevember 1923 the Adjutant General advised the Quartermaster General that the new insignia had been approved for inclusion in AR 600-75, and on 26 March 1924 the Quarter-master General submitted a sample of the new device to the Adjutant General for approval. The Adjutant General in turn approved the insignia on 31 March 1924. These insignia were originally made in pairs, and were one inch in everall height, meeting the Adjutant General's specification of 11 April 1924. When the standing-collar uniform was replaced by the more medern epen-cellar model in 1926, the insignia was reduced to 3/4 inch in everall height and made in ene style only: with the sphinx fasing to the viewer's left.
(see sketches 1 and 2) This device was wern only by meanbors of the organized reserves, as no separate intelligence branch existed at this time in the regular army table of erganization. The insignia was also wern, hewever, by mem bers of the Military Intelligence Division, G-2, War Department General Staff.

ARMY SECURITY (USAR): On 13 October 1953 the G-2 of the US Army Security Agency (USASA), by the Assistant Chief of Itaff G-2 and through the Assistant Chiefs of Staff G-1 and -4, Department of the Army, requested approval of an insignia for wear by Army Security Agency personnel in reserve status. Five proposed designs were forwarded for consideration, and on 15 December 1953 the Quartermaster Gen-

eral forwarded four more proposed designs. On 18 January 1954 the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, Department of the Army, reported that the Chief of the Army Security Agency had selected a design of crossed keys and a lightning flash, and recommended its adoption. (see sketches 3 and 4) On 1 February 1954 the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1, advised the Quartermaster General that this design had been approved. The Army Security Reserve insignia was worn by both efficer and enlisted personnel of the USASA (USAR). Astive duty efficars usually were Signal Cerps branch insignia, however, while enlisted personnel on active duty with the USASA usually were the Pederal cagle device of the Detached Enlisted Men's List (DEML), more commonly known as "Unassigned to Branch." When the merger of the Army Security Agency and Army Intelligence was effected in 1962, both the Army Security (USAR) and the Army Intelligence (USAR) insignia became obsolute.

MILITARY INTELLIGENCE BRANCH: The formation of a new branch of service, to be called the army Intelligence and Security Branch, was approved by the Office of the Chief of Staff, Department of the Army, in an anneuncement dated 29 June 1962. On 5 October 1962 the Vice Chief of Staff, Department of the Army, approved a new branch insignia to be were by all persennel, both on active duty and in reserve status. (see sketch 5) Army Intelligence (USAR) and Army Security (USAR) were discontinued as separate branches and their persennel were reassigned to the Army Intelligence and Security Branch. On 1 July 1967 the Army Intelligence and Security Branch was redesignated as the Military Intelligence Eranch, but no change in insignia accompanied the redesignation. As a result of the Victuum War the Military Intelligence Branch insignia has been manufactured in an all-black version for Wear on the fatigue uniform.

NOTES: (1) Although information from the Institute of Heraldry indicates that nine designs for an insignia for the Army Security (USAR) were submitted and considered, neither of the authors has any knewledge of the eight disapproved designs. Anyone with such information is requested to contact either author.

(2) Both the army Intelligence (USAR) and the army Security (USAR) insignias were also manufactured in cloth versions (gold design on clive drab cloth) for wear on the fatigue uniform. The army Intelligence and Security/Military Intelligence Branch insignia has been manufactured in soveral versions for wear on the fatigue uniform. Originally it was made in a gold and blued design ambreidered on clive drab cloth but it is new wern in all black — either ambreidered on clive drab cloth or of metal with a dull-black anedized finish.



 - B) Variation of an "A" insignia; differs slightly from the approved sample in color, finish, size, stc.
- (C) Insignia worn by an organization, samples of which have never been approved or are not known to have been approved by The Adjutant General, The Office of the Quartermaster General or The Institute of Heraldry, U. S. Army. Undoubtedly some insignia bearing this classification are "A" insignia but until such time as it can be definately

Differs from Number 302A in that the base of the shield is light instead of teal blue.

On a teal blue shield an abased silver volcano surmounted by a black pellet charged with a silver star; in chief an orange lightning flash fosswise. The motto "NEMD VIGILANTER" (No

one more watchful) is black on a silver scroll. (29 x 26mm)




309A 309th ASA EN (C) CLASS
On a white shield a pale emitting in saltire four lightning flashes, all teal blue, charged with a key, bit to dexter in base, the bow a bear's head, all gold. The motto "SENTREIS OF SEGURITY" is teal blue on a gold scroll. (29 x 28m)

(A) CLASS
On a shield divided per fess
teal blue & white, in order between 2 silver flashes a silver
phoenix rising from red flames
of fire & in base a teal blue
sword fesswise. The motto

1st MIBARS

Teal blue shield, silver border and scroll. Winged ring, arm and hand yellow. Eye white and black. INFORMARE LABORAMUS (Work for Information) black. Eye represents observation, arm is a lightning flash representing signal and the hand represents support.



HHC, 1st MIBARS

Blue numbers one, yellow upper, left and lower borders with thin black border. Yellow winged ring with black and white eye. yellow map of Vietnam with red lines and stars indicating detachment locations at Da Nang, Nha Trang, Bien Hoa and Can Tho and Headquarters at Saigon. HHC, MIBARS and 19 VIETNAM 66 red. Other variations exist.



Detachment A, 1st MIBARS

Blue shield, yellow scroll, both with silver borders. III red, blue disc, black and white eye and yellow wings. Located at Bien Hoa.



Detachment B, 1st MIBARS

Blue disc and tab with red borders. DI of 1st MIBARS, "B" DET, 1ST MIBARS and BEST BY TEST silver. Located at Da Nang.



Detachment C, 1st MIBARS

Gray shield, yellow C, three red bars and IV. Tab and scroll teal blue, DETACH-MENT and 1ST MIBARS yellow. Overall border black. Located at Can Tho.



Detachment D, 1st MIBARS

Blue disc, silver rectangle, red map of Vietnam. NHA TRANG and VIETNAM black. Eagle is black with silver head, three lines yellow as is "D" DET, 1ST and MIBARS. Border of disc is black. Located at Nha Trang.



519TH MI Bn

DI of the unit: gold shield and scroll, dark blue globe, Sphinx, STRENGTH THRU IN-TELLIGENCE and detail of scroll. Grids, book and detail of Sphinx gold.



525th MI Group




131st AVN Co (Variation
